



UCCSN Articulation Board

Committee Charter

AUTHORITY

Pursuant to Title IV, Chapter 14, Section 12 of the Board of Regents Handbook, a UCCSN Articulation Board may be established as needed to review and evaluate current articulation policies and formulate additional policies. The Articulation Board shall report to the chancellor and shall be appointed in conformity with Section 1.4.11 of the University and Community College System of Nevada Code¹.

CHARGE

The UCCSN Articulation Board is charged with the following directives:

1. Recommend to the chancellor and the Board of Regents proposed policies related to articulation and transfer between UCCSN institutions.
2. Develop procedures to improve community college-state college-university articulation by exploring such issues as, general education core requirements, prerequisites, common course numbering, admissions standards and academic advising.
3. Provide for cooperative research among the community colleges, the state college, and the universities in such areas as admissions, grading practices, curriculum design, and follow-up on transfer students.
4. Authorize committees or task forces consisting of representatives from all levels of higher education to facilitate articulation in subject areas.
5. Encourage regular communication between and among university, state college, and community college faculty members, particularly on joint curriculum projects.

MEMBERSHIP

The Articulation Board will be chaired by the UCCSN Associate Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs. Board members will be jointly appointed by each institutional vice president of academic affairs and vice president of student affairs.

¹UCCSN Code 1.4.11 - The chancellor may establish University and Community College System of Nevada committees and ad hoc committees to facilitate the administration of the System. The members of such committees shall be appointed by the chancellor for one-year terms and are eligible for reappointment. The chancellor shall consult with the presidents when appointing system committees.
