My family and I come from Chanki, a small village in Pakistan. Chanki is one of the poorest and least populated villages in the state of Punjab. We moved to America when I was nine years old with my mother and five siblings. In 2005, I enrolled in College of Southern Nevada High School Program which gave me the opportunity to partake in dual credit courses counting towards both high school and college completion. I was successfully working towards my dream of becoming a doctor by maintaining a high and stable GPA and developing leadership skills as treasurer of student council. However, in 2005 things began to change for the worse for my family: my father, who was the main provider for the family lost his business and had a heart attack shortly after. Without income from the business my family lost our car and soon we were on the verge of losing our house. I saw the emotional distress this caused in my family; the suffering and hardship they were experiencing emotionally was unbearable. I committed to myself that I would get my family out of this situation. I got my first job at the age of fourteen and have since been working multiple jobs to support my family. Slowly I started to skip classes in order to work and prioritizing providing for my family above my studies became a habit. By the age of sixteen, I was working 45 hours a weeks and rarely made it to class on time. My grades started to shift drastically and soon I began to fail most of my college classes. In 2008, I graduated high school with a GPA of 2.8 and college GPA of 1.4. I didn't attend my high school graduation, because I didn't feel like I accomplished anything. My dream to become a doctor was slowly fading away as I focused my efforts of helping support my brothers, sisters, and parents. I came to Nevada State College in the summer of 2008 to start with a clean slate. At NSC, I learned time management skills that helped me successfully maintain a high GPA despite my need to continue to work multiple jobs. With the help of my NSC family, I have learned to find balance in life and have had an enriched student experience participating in multiple organizations and activities around the school. I have participated in student government, in the Blue Marble biology club, gone to Ethiopia with other NSC students on a medical mission, and have participated in NSC's first summer and fall semesters of undergraduate biology research. Right now I am focused on getting my dual degree in Biology and Psychology and plan to graduate in May 2012. I am very proud and grateful for this second chance at college and a prosperous life for myself and my family.

Nicholas Thaler holds an M.A. in Psychology from CSU-Northridge and an M.A. in Clinical Psychology from UNLV. He is currently a Ph.D. candidate in UNLV's Clinical Psychology program where he is researching neuropsychology, brain injury, and attention deficit disorder. He has 13 peer-reviewed publications, eight of which are first author manuscripts, five additional that are under review and several others in preparation to be submitted over the coming year. He has 26 published abstracts and has delivered papers or posters at international, national, and local scientific conferences. Not only is the quantity of his research productivity remarkable but the quality as well especially remembering that his program requires 96 credits hours. His advisor states, "His research is characterized by a breadth of knowledge, sophisticated statistical analyses, and a clarity of thinking that is rare to find in one so early in his career." Nicholas also has a passion for mentorship. He holds weekly meetings for the undergraduate research assistants to discuss professional issues and recent research. He hosts a biweekly journal club aimed to educate and discuss issues of neuropsychological research and has conducted workshops on preparing for graduate school and all that entails. He also mentors for the outreach program that pairs mentors with undergraduate students from underrepresented populations. Nicholas' goal is to be a university researcher and mentor other upcoming scientists in the field. Nicholas is the well-rounded scholar that we hope all of our students become.

She is President and founder of the Iranian Heritage Society, served as Student Vice President (2008-2011) of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, and served as a legislative intern with Congresswoman Dina Titus in summer of 2010. She has tutored other UNLV students in Biology and General and Organic Chemistry and volunteered in the Department of Oncology at St. Rose Dominican hospital for the last three years.
