
## Q1: TUITION

## Cumulative Increase in Tuition, Median Income, and Consumer Price Index 2008-2013






## Q2: SPENDING RATIOS 10-years (administrative vs. instructional)





(All Campuses\*: Fall 2015 Classroom Use by Day and Time)



(All Campuses\*: Summer 2015 Classroom Use by Day and Time)

















 What do the results of the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) show about our institution?









## SUMMARY Compared to Carnegie Peers

- Lower satisfaction with educational experiences.
  - Quality interactions with faculty.
  - Challenging coursework.
  - Differing predictors for first-year students and seniors.
- Equivalent indicators of engagement.
  - Trivial or small statistical differences.
- High impact practices.
  - Seniors' participation trailed.
  - First year students exceeded.


