2015 Undergraduate Regents Scholar Award Nominee Statement - Kevin Omeed Tamadonfar

How would you assess your experience at UNLV academically and personally, and how has your UNLV experience, in the broadest sense, prepared you for achieving your future goals?

With my father being a professor at UNLV, I have essentially grown up on our campus. This has given me the opportunity to observe the university's efforts, challenges, and accomplishments over the past twenty years. UNLV has indeed developed into a quality research and teaching institution with great potentials for becoming a tier one university. This is why, despite graduating as a valedictorian from high school with numerous opportunities to leave the state, I decided to enroll at UNLV. I found the opportunities at UNLV to be taught by research professors and to gain meaningful academic and research experiences to be invaluable.

As a student, my experiences have been exceptionally positive. Academically, my classes in the life sciences have provided me with a deep understanding of current topics in my field. This understanding has been fostered by the opportunity to be taught by and interact with professors who conduct cutting-edge research in their fields, an opportunity which I would not have had in other universities. Personally, I have been able to conduct research on the microbial ecology of hot springs in Dr. Brian Hedlund's laboratory and, under his mentorship, I have been able to secure a number of undergraduate research grants and fellowships. Furthermore, I have been involved in a number of student organizations including AED and the Phi Kappa Phi chapter that have enabled me to partake in numerous community service projects which have been personally fulfilling. As the student vice president of Phi Kappa Phi, I have gained leadership skills and abilities through interactions with students, staff, faculty, and administrators across the campus.

My experience at UNLV has been further enriched by the Honors College. The College has provided me with a well-rounded, liberal arts education. Its seminars and functions create numerous opportunities to learn from capable faculty, caring administrators, and students across different disciplines. The College's nurturing and intellectually stimulating environment has not only offered me a unique learning environment but also has ensured my future success. During my medical school interviews I have noticed the positive impact of this college on my broader understanding of social issues and my ability to connect with my peers from other universities.

In the future, I will be continuing my education in graduate and professional school in order to enter a career in academic medicine. As evidenced in extensive interest in my application by some of the top medical schools in the country, UNLV has prepared me well to successfully pursue my future education. Access to advising in the Honors College and College of Sciences, particularly pre-medical advising by Dr. Joseph Nika, has been invaluable in allowing me to progress toward graduation while also positioning me for my future career. As a native Nevadan, I am grateful for the opportunities that UNLV has afforded me. This would not have been possible without the seemingly tireless efforts by dedicated staff, capable faculty, and thoughtful administrators.

I am writing to express my appreciation for the academic and personal growth that I have experienced as a doctoral student at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. As the first biomechanics doctoral student in the Department of Kinesiology and Nutrition Sciences at UNLV I have been active in conducting and overseeing research in the UNLV Biomechanics Laboratory, located in the Sports Injury Research Center. As a result of my past and proposed research, under the supervision of Dr. Janet Dufek, the UNLV Graduate College has awarded me the UNLV Foundation President's Graduate Research Fellowship during a focused institutional initiative on the Path to Tier One Research University. Studying in a young doctoral program has provided several unique opportunities that have lead to tremendous growth in my time at UNLV. Experiences mentoring undergraduate student researchers during the 2012 & 2013 Institutional Development Award Network of Biomedical Research Excellence (INBRE) have offered invaluable preparation for continued research and university instruction.

As a doctoral student and researcher at UNLV, I have had the opportunity to build two independent research focuses, examining movement control strategies and the implications of movement pattern alterations. My primary line of research, including the topic of my doctoral dissertation, utilizes multivariate statistical techniques that evaluate potential causes of movement dysfunction and injury, which I believe are an important advancement in the field of biomechanics. In parallel to my primary area of research, I have had the opportunity to conduct investigations examining three-dimensional impact kinetics during running, for which I was fortunate to receive the Norman James Research Award at the 32nd Annual Meeting of the Southwest Chapter of the American College of Sports Medicine. Additionally, my follow-up research proposal examining the role of footwear in moderating impact kinetics was awarded the New Balance ® Footwear Research Award. Balance between my outlined research tracks and the use of success from one project in building momentum in future projects has been rewarding and encouraging as a developing independent researcher. This approach demonstrates research growth and will serve as a strength in my pursuit of future research funding.

In addition to research and scholarly activity, I have been an active member of the Graduate & Professional Student Association, and Rebel Science, Technology, Engineering, & Math Academy. These experiences have been valuable in developing effective communication skills and promoting research at UNLV. Continued involvement in professional organizations, including international, national, and regional chapters of societies for biomechanics, sports medicine, neuroscience, motor control, and engineering further demonstrates my commitment to scholarly development. As I approach the completion of my doctoral studies, I am placed in a position for sustained productivity and future success. Collectively, I believe these experiences make me a suitable candidate for the 2015 Nevada Regents' Graduate Scholar Award.

Biography for Regents' Scholar Award

Ivón Padilla-Rodríguez is a junior in the Honors Program at the University double majoring in history and philosophy of ethics, law, and politics with a minor in ethnic/Latino studies. Ivón is an advocate for the Latino community as a Legislative Affairs intern for Mi Familia Vota, the Executive Director of the UNR Latino Student Advisory Board, and an undergraduate researcher at UNR's Latino Research Center. She has lobbied for student and Latino immigrants' rights at the Nevada State Legislature and United States Congress, founded a scholarship mentoring initiative in the local school district for documented and undocumented first generation students, and completed grant-funded research on the impact of immigration reform on mixed-status Latino families in the U.S., which she presented to members of Congress in April of this year. Her research today involves working towards completing her honors thesis on the impact U.S. military intervention in Central America had on the immigration of unaccompanied child migrants to the U.S. She is also coauthoring a book about undocumented youth with the Director of the Latino Research Center, Dr. Emma Sepúlveda. Ivón co-founded a youth theatre program called Spotlight: Academy for Young Actors at a non-profit theatre and secured partnerships to teach at-risk Latino youth in the U.S., Mexico, Costa Rica, Cuba, and Chile. She studied abroad while in Costa Rica and Cuba on USAC programs. In Chile, she interned for the National Congress of Chile where she conducted research on Chilean immigration policy and attended an international conference on the rights immigrants. Inspired by her experiences at the state, national, and international level, she is currently planning the state's inaugural "Nevada Latino Leadership Conference" to be held in April of 2015 at the University of Nevada, Reno. She is our University's sixth Truman Scholar, was named a "2014 Top Ten College Woman" by Glamour magazine, and is a grand-prize winner (\$100,000) and spokesperson of the Dr Pepper Tuition Giveaway.

Brian recovered from his coma, but remained blind and quadriplegic. After regaining his ability to speak, he encouraged Ryan to follow his dream and head back to Nevada. Ryan returned to Reno, enrolled at TMCC, and has worked toward his Associates of Science degree while engaging in extensive community service, from organizing large events to serving meals to the homeless at the Reno-Sparks Gospel Mission. He plans to graduate this year and transfer to UNR, where he will continue his education and his service to others as he pursues his goal to fulfill the responsibility he has to his brother, family, and fellow human beings to fulfill all of his vast potential and to be grateful for all the experience he has gained along the way.
