1. AGENDA ITEM TITLE: Gift of Art (Ceramics) to Permanent Collection of the University of

Nevada, Reno

MEETING DATE: December 1-2, 2016

2. BACKGROUND & POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

The donor, Kohler Foundation, Inc. (KFI), wishes to gift a collection of art to the Department of Art at the University of Nevada, Reno. Exhibit 1. The collection consists of 36 ceramic objects made by acclaimed self-taught visionary artist Mary Bowron. KFI gifts these artworks with the condition that University of Nevada, Reno will hold, promote and exhibit the works of art as part of its permanent collection; will maintain and preserve them to museum quality standards; and will not sell or otherwise dispose of the works, without the consent of Kohler Foundation, Inc.

The collection of ceramic objects by Mary Bowron was appraised by Shari Cavin of Cavin-Morris Gallery, 201 11th Ave., New York, New York. Exhibit 2. Ms. Cavin is a member of the Appraisers Association of America and her appraisals comply with the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice. She sits on the Board of Directors of the Appraisers Association of America and fulfills all IRS requirements of a qualified appraiser, defined in IRS publication 561 as an individual who has earned an appraisal designation from a recognized professional appraiser organization.

Kohler Foundation is committed to the preservation of art environments and important collections. In the past, Kohler Foundation's preservation efforts have been focused almost entirely in the state of Wisconsin which is home to Kohler Company. However, the Foundation has recently committed to expanding its preservation efforts nationwide. Kohler Foundation's preservation efforts are regarded at the forefront of the self-taught art movements. Numerous Midwestern and national publications, including The New York Times, have cited Kohler Foundation's work in preservation and art.

The Department of Art agrees to maintain the Collection for teaching purposes and periodic exhibition. The gift is being made directly to the Department of Art, which has established practices for collecting, inventorying, archiving and maintaining artwork. Secure, climate-controlled art collection facilities will ensure the security of the Collection as it is received. The permanent collection of art is undergoing a new cataloguing project that will make the work more widely available to citizens of Nevada through a searchable online database. Objects from this gift will be added to this database and allow the Department of Art to further extend the donor's wish that the work be shared and promoted.

No potential effort to de-accession the work will commence without contact with the original donor and any de-accession would require the approval of the Permanent Collection Committee, the department chair, and the dean of the College of Liberal Arts

and the Board of Regents.

The Department of Art is very interested in receiving this collection to benefit teaching and community exhibition opportunities. This gift will complement the collection and extend our growing and distinctive collection of art by self-taught artists-a collecting area that cannot be ignored by research institutions such as ours.

Direct costs associated with accepting the Collection include regular salaries for current student employees and/or the University Galleries director who will catalog and enter objects into the database, review photo descriptions, place objects in storage and correspond with KFI to arrange the gift. Total cost of salaries for work performed in accepting this gift is less than \$1,000. KFI will pay for transportation and insurance in-transit. The UNR self-insurance plan will cover the artwork as part of the permanent art collection at the University.

Acceptance of the gift does not obligate NSHE or the University of Nevada, Reno to commit institutional resources, or services other than the commitment made to carry out the intent of the donor for the use of the gift. Nor does it obligate the University, System Administration or any unit of the Chancellor's Office to any matching commitments. Objects from the Collection will go into a collection room that is currently used to house the University's permanent collection. This space is already lit, secured, heated, and cooled.

The University does not anticipate the Collection will generate revenue. Generally, art exhibitions at the University are at no charge to students and the public. When the Collection goes into an exhibition, the small costs associated with organizing a permanent collection exhibition are covered by fees from ASUN, federal work-study funding, and grants. Other than grants from Nevada Arts Council, the Director of University Gallery wages, and physical plant costs, no state-government allocated funds support the permanent collection. Membership fees, donations, and volunteer labor pay to conserve collection objects.

The designation of the purpose of the gift-to benefit teaching and community exhibition opportunities-is in accordance with mission statements, the Board of Regents' policies and procedures including the Academic Master Plan, the laws of the State of Nevada and the Internal Revenue Code.

Following the Board of Regents' approval and acceptance of the gift of art from KFI, the University of Nevada, Reno Department of Arts as well as the College of Liberal Arts will acknowledge receipt of the gift in a timely manner. In addition, the University of Nevada, Reno Foundation will provide KFI with a written gift receipt issued in accordance with applicable federal income tax regulations.

3. SPECIFIC ACTIONS BEING RECOMMENDED OR REQUESTED:

President Marc A. Johnson requests approval of the acceptance of an art collection gift from the Kohler Foundation to be placed in the permanent collection at the University of Nevada, Reno (Title 4, Chapter 10, Section 9).

4. IMPETUS (WHY NOW?):

The artworks need to be placed with a long-term institutional home. The works have been conserved and are ready to share with the public after being in private hands for some time. KFI is motivated to place the work with UNR. The University will be an important, early partner in extending KFI's reach beyond its headquarters in Wisconsin.

5. BULLET POINTS TO SUPPORT REQUEST/RECOMMENDATION:

- The Department of Art does not have the resources or the opportunity to obtain artwork of this caliber and value on its own.
- The Collection will be a valuable tool for enhancing student experiences in both art history and studio classes.
- These objects are a significant addition to an under-developed collection of 3D and sculptural objects
- The Department of Art has the faculty expertise to maintain and to properly house the Collection.
- Areas of major weakness will be filled by this gift and help build interest among our community in the activities of the Department of Art.
- Community members will also have the opportunity to appreciate the Collection through exhibitions.
- Student staff will work directly with the director of University Galleries to accession the gift as well as develop a plan for exhibiting the work in the newly renovated permanent collection gallery in Church Fine Arts.

6. POTENTIAL ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE REQUEST/RECOMMENDATION:

• Upon receiving the Collection, staff time will be required to inventory and catalog the work.

7. ALTERNATIVE(S) TO WHAT IS BEING REQUESTED/RECOMMENDED:

• Forego the opportunity and not accept the gift knowing that the Collection may go to another educational institution outside of Northern Nevada.
